



GUIDELINES FOR POLICY INNOVATION SECTION

The *Journal of Comparative Policy Analysis* is committed to publishing outstanding scholarly manuscripts in all areas of Public Policy. The papers submitted should be of the highest scholarly standard and adhere to the JCPA readership's expectations as outlined in the **JCPA's Comparative Aims and Scope** (see www.jcpa.ca)

The **Policy Innovation** section of the **JCPA** welcomes papers that discuss a new innovation in any area of policy analysis in any country, and which outlines the possible benefits of the lesson drawn for other contexts. Manuscripts should contain the following sections:

- Description of an innovative policy that has been adopted. This section should also explain what is unique or innovative about the policy.
- Provide some evidence that it is a good policy or at least an improvement over current policies. We are looking for reasonable, independent validations, not necessarily sophisticated econometric analysis.
- Discuss the applicability of this policy in other jurisdictions and any barriers to implementation, if any.

It is generally expected that submitted papers will normally be shorter than the regular submission at 4,000-6,000 words.

Please submit your paper in MS Word via the Journal's web site at <http://www.jcpa.ca/index2.php> with "Policy Innovation" in the subject line. Make sure your paper is clean of all identifying author information including the author's name in the file properties. Papers should include an abstract of 100 words and 4-7 keywords, double-spaced and in 12-point font. British or American spelling is acceptable provided usage is consistent. Authors should also consult the most recent volume of the Journal for style.

Please note: The **JCPA** publishes only high quality scholarly papers. Each paper is double-blind reviewed by three reviewers. JCPA's acceptance rate is 21%. Acceptance, revision, or rejection decisions will be conveyed to the author by the editor-in-charge of an article. Acceptance or rejection decisions are reached in consultation with the Editor-in-chief who has final authority.

The **JCPA** commits to a particularly fast response track. Articles submitted receive a first response within 10-12 days, within which time, if found suitable, it is assigned three reviewers. Reviewers are requested to submit their reviews within 45 days. Nevertheless, the topic, the quality and contents of the articles, as well as timely adequate submissions and resubmissions are the responsibility of the author under whose name the article appears.
